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Chess is a strategy game for two players. The goal is to attack the enemy king, and put him under control. This means that the king cannot move without being captured. The rules of the game are based on figures, half of which are black and half are white. True, game manufacturers, who are in the business of fun, create games with non-traditional colors and replace typical game figures with other characters, but for the purposes of this article we will use standard colors. The Chess Board advertising has 64 squares, which alternate in color from black (or dark) to white (or light) across eight rows. Four squares in the center of the board (positions E-4, E-5, D-4, D-5) are the most important in terms of control and victory in the game. Each player starts with 16 game figures, either all black or all white, including eight pawns, two rooks, two knights, a king and a queen. Both players will cross their playing pieces on the board in the same order. A way to ensure that the board collides in the right direction is to remember the white on the right, meaning there should be no white square on the far right corner. To make sure you place the pieces in order along the back rank, it's helpful to remember the pieces get higher as you move in. Rooks, or parts that look like a castle, go to the corners; knights, parts that look like horses, occupy space next to the rooks; and two bishops sit in the squares inside the knights. You have two spaces and two parts on the left. Remember that the queen always goes in her color. The smart way to remember this rule is that the queen's dress should always fit her shoes. Each of the eight squares in the next row or rank holds the pawn. The goal of chess is to capture the king of the enemy, but since actually capturing the king against the rules of the game, the players tend to mate. Sounds confusing? At first it is. Think of the game as a battle. All your pieces work to capture or remove enemy shapes from the board by moving to the squares they occupy. Capturing parts of it, his king becomes more vulnerable and open to attack. Meanwhile, you also have to protect your king and keep your own parts from capture. This is where the strategy comes into play. When you have your pieces in a position where your next move will be to capture the enemy king (if it were allowed), you have him in check. Now your opponent must make a move to save his king or get him out of control. If the king is trapped and has no way of escape, it is called a mate and you have won. Each part is assigned points, and there are rules on how it can move around the board. The point assigned to each is just to show your strength in terms of how it can move. At the end of the game has no score-based points based on the parts that you have captured.
